Clean for The Queen

Her Majesty The Queen celebrates her 90th birthday in 2016. To celebrate this event, <u>Keep Britain Tidy</u> asked people throughout the UK to join together and present a gift to her, a gift that will benefit us all. In the run up to The Queen's birthday, officially celebrated in June 2016, they aimed to inspire a million people to take action and enjoy a few hours together litter-picking to make the places where we live more beautiful.

To support this National campaign <u>Cheshire East Council provided 100 litter picking kits</u> comprising of 6 litter pickers, bag hoops, high visibility vests and a quantity of disposable gloves and refuse sacks. Local community groups, councils, businesses and neighbours across Cheshire East applied for the packs and in less than a week all 100 had been requested. Due to careful purchasing there was enough money left over to purchase an additional 24 packs that were again very quickly snapped up.

The campaign was really embraced by people throughout Cheshire East and we saw a number of people taking pride in the areas where they live and work. Some of the 70 plus groups who got involved are now completing regular litter picks and other, established, groups have gained new volunteers.

National Recognition of Heritage Railway Signs at Handforth Station



The Friends of Handforth Station were delighted at the start of the new year, their 20th anniversary, to receive news that two of their unique collections of railway signs were designated by the Board of Trustees of the <u>Science Museum Group</u>. This Group is charged under the 1996 Railway Heritage Act to identify artefacts and records of significance for preservation.

The designated signs are the Regional Railways sign on the Manchester platform and the British Railways enamel sign on the Crewe platform. In addition to these, there is also a collection of over twenty modern International Railways' "Handforth" signs. The

designation requires Network Rail and the Train Operating Company to retain the signs and prevents them from removing the designated item without agreement from the Science Museum, through the Designation Advisory Board. This will help ensure the continuing exhibition of these signs.

New health app set to CATCH on

An innovative new health app for parents and carers of children aged 0-5 years has been launched. The <u>CATCH</u> app, is now available for free on the App Store for iPhones and iPads, and on Play Store for Androids and tablets.



The app was developed by <u>NHS Eastern Cheshire Clinical Commissioning Group</u> (CCG), <u>NHS South</u> <u>Cheshire CCG</u> and <u>Cheshire East Council</u> to provide:

- NHS-approved health advice
- Highly localised information about healthcare services and support groups in Cheshire East
- Timely notifications about key health dates, such as childhood immunisations

The app is also highly personalised, as parents can input their child's date of birth and it will only present health information and reminders that are relevant to their child's age. CATCH came about as a result of a study undertaken by the council's Public Health department, which found that A&E attendance among 0-4 year olds in Cheshire East is much higher than the national average. CATCH stands for Common Approach to Children's Health, reflecting the joined-up approach to care that is being promoted in Cheshire East.

practice. They will give some presentations and hope that everyone will leave with clear referral pathways for those people they may come in to contact with, who may need a bit of additional support.



Together we can Tackle Child Abuse

Cheshire East Council is supporting a national campaign launched by the Department for Education to tackle child abuse. The campaign 'Together we can Tackle Child Abuse' encourages members of the public and community groups to report child abuse and neglect. It highlights that we all have a role to play in protecting children and young people in our local area. The campaign encourages people to report, even if they are not absolutely certain about their suspicions and features an 'ABC' of spotting the signs of child abuse and neglect:

- Appearance such as frequent unexplained injuries, consistently poor hygiene, matted hair, unexplained gifts, or a parent regularly collecting children from school when drunk;
- Behaviour such as demanding or aggressive behaviour, frequent lateness or absence from school, avoiding their own family, misusing drugs or alcohol, or being constantly tired;



Information is usually gathered from many sources and any concerns would form one part of a bigger picture. Children and families can be helped at an earlier stage with preventative support, if more members of the public share their concerns.

Cheshire East students take part in Fatal Distraction performance

Hundreds descended on the <u>Crewe Lyceum Theatre</u> for '<u>Fatal</u> <u>Distraction</u>' - a moving and challenging performance devised by Cheshire students working alongside the <u>Manchester Camerata</u> <u>Orchestra</u>. The piece, which also featured a cameo appearance by Crewe's White Watch and the Cheshire Fire Choir, was the third collaboration between the orchestra and the Service and was all about educating young drivers about the dangers that exist on our roads.

Deputy Chief Fire Officer, Mark Cashin said: "The event was a great success and it was wonderful to see how the young



people had worked so hard to create a brilliant performance and a truly special event. It is a terribly stark statistic that the single biggest cause of accidental deaths in young people remains the road traffic accident. A major contributor to this is people being distracted at the wheel. All the young people involved in the piece were at that age where they had either just passed their driving test or are taking lessons. Therefore, we really hope that the messages they have explored in the creation of the piece stay with them and ultimately keep them and their friends safe."

Projects such as 'Fatal Distraction' are all about education and enabling the Service to promote safety in an innovative way and, by doing so, have a positive impact on the Service's aim of a Cheshire where there are no deaths, injuries or damage from fires and other emergencies.

Supporting Carers to get more active



<u>Everybody Sport and Recreation</u> (ESAR) are holding sessions for carers to meet, chat and share information with other carers whilst trying out new activities and sports. The sessions are tailored to each individual and aimed at all ages and abilities. Carers can even bring along the person that they are caring for to the session or a friend. It is a great opportunity to get more active and try out new things whilst looking after a carer's own health and wellbeing at the same time.

Activities vary from yoga, fitness classes, racquet sports, archery, bowling, walking, zumba and more. Sessions run monthly across seven different leisure centres and cost £2.80 per session. In addition ESAR are exploring opportunities to attend local parent and carers groups to talk about what they can offer and to deliver sessions directly.

Hospital Trust Chairman Receives County Accolade

<u>Mid Cheshire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust's</u> Chairman, Dennis Dunn MBE, has been appointed as a Deputy Lieutenant of Cheshire. Dennis, who was a Governor and then Non-Executive Director of the Trust before becoming Chairman in 2014, was formally presented with his Commission of Appointment in January by David Briggs MBE, the county's Lord-Lieutenant.

Deputy Lieutenants are appointed by the <u>Lord-Lieutenant</u> (HM The Queen's Representative in the County) to support him with a range of duties, and in particular to deputise for him when he is not available, and tend to be people who have served the local community or who have a history of public service. Dennis is former Pro Vice Chancellor International of Manchester Metropolitan University and, as well as his work for the Trust, is currently Cheshire President of the British Red Cross and Visiting Professor at Huizhou University, China.



Hospices join together for Love Your Local Hospice TV Ad Campaign

A series of TV advertisements were recently filmed on location at The Donna Louise Children's Hospice, Trentham who support over 200 children and families with life-limiting or life threatening conditions across Staffordshire and Cheshire. It was shown on ITV over a 10 day period, from Sunday 14th February, and it showcases the love, care, friendship and support each of the hospices provides to patients, young and old, and their families.



Each year, hospices across the Midlands care for over 26,000 adult patients and support over 1,500 children and their families. The cost of providing all these services each year is approximately £80 million and many hospices are reliant on voluntary donations to meet these costs and without them they simply wouldn't exist. Not forgetting the time generously given by an army of dedicated and skilled volunteers who donate up to 800,000 hours each year to support in so many ways.

Liz Gratton, Director of Income Generation at The Donna Louise said: "It was great that we were able to work together with other hospices, a total

Love Your Local Hospice of 16 from the Midlands, to drive this initiative forward. Joining forces on this project has been a fantastic demonstration of what can be achieved by working together as well as a perfect opportunity to help educate and break down perceptions surrounding hospice care."

Mike McDonald, Chief Executive of The Donna Louise added: "Without the collaboration of the 16 hospices coming together, this campaign would not have been possible to advertise on primetime TV. Each hospice in the West Midlands region is a very individual organisation, for local people in their community. However, through working together, it became clear we shared many frustrations around the common misconceptions people can hold about us. With this campaign we're hoping to break down these myths and barriers by bringing the reality of what we are all about into people's homes and onto their TV screens. It is our hope that people watching will be encouraged to find out more about their local hospice so that, should they or someone in their family require the help and support, a hospice can provide then they know how to go about it".
